Dear Readers,

Like so many of us, my attention is pulled in many different directions these days. The regular demands of work and family are ever-present, while the news headlines come so rapidly that it's hard to keep up. The cultural tendencies of this time invite us to flit quickly from one story to another, sampling information and taking in various soundbites, both social and spiritual, clicking quickly and never diving too deep. Amid the mental clutter of so many neon-bright attention-grabbers, the choice to read a book (or many books!) fully and carefully, as the Reading Program suggests, seems nearly countercultural—and maybe that's exactly what we need.

One of the greatest gifts of reading, in my opinion, is the invitation to think slowly and deliberately, to tend to just one idea at a time, to immerse myself in the author's world, and to be fully present. Sometimes I find myself nodding along with an eager internal agreement, practically sighing with relief that someone else has articulated what I feel like I've always known but never been able to put into words. Sometimes, I find myself challenged, puzzled, even irritated, and confounded by new ideas that rub up against my prior assumptions and create internal friction. Comfort is easier to embrace than agitation, but both are helpful on the path of personal growth.

The history of the Reading Program is long and laudable. Audrie E. Reber, in *Women United for Mission: A History of the Women's Society of World Service of the Evangelical United Brethren Church, 1946-1968*, describes at length "The Reading Course" of the women's organization of the EUB, one of the churches that united to form today's United Methodist Church. She writes, "The women had always been encouraged to read both that they might know more about the mission areas for which the church has responsibility and that they might understand and care for people" (46). The women then, like Reading Program participants today, were not just engaging in surface-level reading. The 1947 Reading Course list included *Dachau Sermons and Beyond Prejudice, A Story of the Church and Japanese Americans*, among many challenging and important texts. In 1968, titles included classics like Georgia Harkness' *Disciplines of the Christian Life* and then cutting-edge documents like *Church Women United for Peace* from the National Council of Churches. None of the 2026 Reading Program titles would be familiar to the 1947 or 1968 cadre of readers, of course—the Reading Program, then and now, is committed to uplifting contemporary work—but our purpose and posture would surely feel familiar.

The Reading Program, an inheritor of a powerful tradition, offers us a deep gift for the mid-2020s. In a time where we are increasingly encouraged to learn—and even to think—in short, high-tech, low-attention bursts, the practices encouraged by the Reading Program offer a welcome, necessary, antidote, a kind of spiritual solace. To read is both humbling and hopeful. It is to admit that we do not already know it all and still have much to learn from each other across our many differences. It is also to continually rediscover that there is an incredible vastness and depth to the world around us and the world inside us.

Read deeply, carefully, and with attention. Savor the message. Consider journaling or taking a prayer walk to reflect on what you read. Like Jacob and the angel, wrestle with the text, not just to agree or disagree, to “like” or “unlike,” but rather with the prayerful purpose of finding the blessing—the wisdom that God meant for you to receive.

If you are able, organize local gatherings to read with others. The insights we glean from one another’s perspectives can be just as valuable as the words on the page. Learning together and listening to each other can be a sacred encounter. You don’t need to be a United Women in Faith member to participate in the Reading Program, so consider opening “Read Together” opportunities to non-members and potential members. If meeting in your church is challenging, consider a non-traditional meeting location like a public library, community center, or coffee shop. If you’d like to stretch yourself further and build an intergenerational experience, consider partnering with a youth group, local college campus, senior center, or retirement community. Many women are hungering for sisterhood and a good book; United Women in Faith can offer both through your local leadership.

Thank you to the amazing team of 175+ volunteer evaluators and the wonderful Reading Program Committee (chaired by Kelly G. Loeb) whose faithful work made possible the 2026 Reading Program. May it be a blessing on your journey.

GENERAL FAQs



- **Where can I find the books?**

You can access books at your public library, from your local bookstore, or through an online retailer. You can also purchase most of the current Reading Program books at **bookshop.org/shop/uwfaith**. United Women in Faith receives 10% back on all purchases from our virtual shelves.



- **How can I receive recognition for participating in the Reading Program as an individual?**

Complete Reading Program Plans I, II, III, or IV. Fill out the reporting form available in the resources section at the end of this catalog. Submit the reporting form to the District or Conference Program Resources Coordinator or designee. Reach out to your district/conference leadership team for the relevant details, including the due date. All members and friends of United Women in Faith who complete a Plan and submit the form in a timely manner are eligible to receive the annual Certificate of Recognition.



- **How can I use the Reading Program resources in a group setting?**

The Reading Program provides excellent content for both regular unit meetings and new All-Access member gatherings. Whether your group is meeting in person or virtually, reading a book together can provide powerful common ground. The books in the Reading Program are specially selected to help women grow spiritually, strengthen their leadership skills, and equip themselves for more effective social action, community-building, and public service. Reading and discussing a shared book can also make for an easier start to meaningful conversation among women who do not yet know each other well. It can also be a way to connect with new women and invite them into our sisterhood. Consider opening your Reading Program book discussions to women who are not yet members of United Women in Faith. Explore hosting groups in non-traditional locations, like public libraries, coffee shops, or parks. Try meeting at times accessible to women in a variety of life situations, including women who are working full-time during the day or shouldering heavy care responsibilities. You can develop your own discussion questions for any book in the Reading Program or begin with the sample discussion questions for this year's Bonus Books, available in the resources section at the end of this catalog.



● What resources support intergenerational learning?

Adult, youth, and children's book selections are included in every category. We encourage you to read and reflect together across the generations. Books written for youth and children can be wonderful learning resources for adults, as well. In addition, the 2026 list includes one intergenerational book set of *Welcoming and Affirming: A Guide to Supporting and Working with LGBTQ+ Christian Youth* for adults and *Queerfully and Wonderfully Made: A Guide for LGBTQ+ Christian Teens* for youth.



● Which years of the Reading Program are eligible for reporting credit?

For 2026, books from the 2021-2022, 2023, 2024, 2025, and 2026 Reading Program lists are all eligible for Reading Program reporting credit. You can find a combined excel list of all these books at bit.ly/RPBookList. The annual Reading Programs are also available in a PDF format for each credit-eligible year at uwfaithresources.org



● Are there other ways to receive Reading Program reporting credit?

Yes. You can also receive Reading Program reporting credit for:

- Listening to the *Faith Talks* podcast: 1 credit in Spiritual Growth for 2+ episodes
- Listening to the *Voices From the Field* podcast: 1 credit in Education for Mission for 2+ episodes
- Reading **response** magazine: 1 credit in Nurturing for Community for reading one year (6 issues)
- Being part of a Mission u or *Keyhole Missiology* study:
 - 1 credit in Spiritual Growth for reading a Mission u study on your own
 - 2 credits in Spiritual Growth for joining a Mission u study together with others, as a leader or participant
- Movies and television programs based on current Reading Program books are also eligible for credit. In determining the category for credit, identify the category of the original book and apply credit for the film to the same category.



● How are books selected?

A large team of volunteer evaluators reads and evaluates potential Reading Program book selections throughout the year. Each book under consideration is independently evaluated by at least three people. The Reading Program Committee uses these evaluations as a basis for their recommendation, considering the overall balance of the list offerings as a whole. Their recommendation is then reviewed and approved by the Governance Committee of the Board of Directors.



- **How can I recommend a book?**

If you would like to suggest a book for consideration for a future Reading Program catalog, you can do so by using the “Suggest a book” link available at uwfaith.org/read.



- **Can I use audiobooks?**

You are always welcome to use audiobooks if that’s an easier and more accessible way for you to read the material.



- **Is there any troubling content in the Reading Program books?
How do I know what to expect?**

The Reading Program is designed to be uplifting and spiritually nourishing while also wrestling honestly with the difficult experiences of our world today, including violence and other potentially triggering content. Where possible, we have added flags to the book descriptions to note any potentially disturbing content regarding: graphic violence (**V**), explicit sexual content (**S**) and/or profane language (**L**). This is not meant to steer you away from these books, but rather to prepare you to know what to expect so you can make informed choices. Unfortunately, we are not able to anticipate all the content that may be disturbing to every one of our readers, since each of us is unique and brings our own particular set of experiences. If you start to read a book and discover that it is too much for you at a given time, then, of course, we encourage you to practice good self-care and set the book aside.

- Selections from the current reading lists if not included in previous reports.

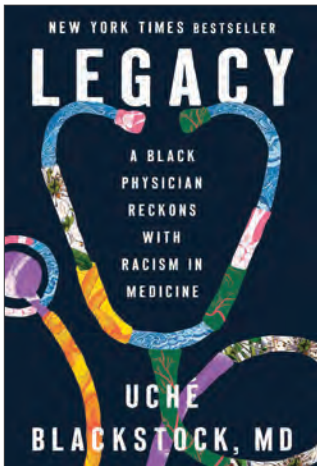

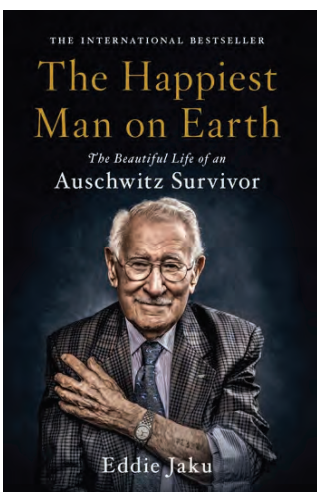


GRACE CAN LEAD US HOME: A CHRISTIAN CALL TO END HOMELESSNESS

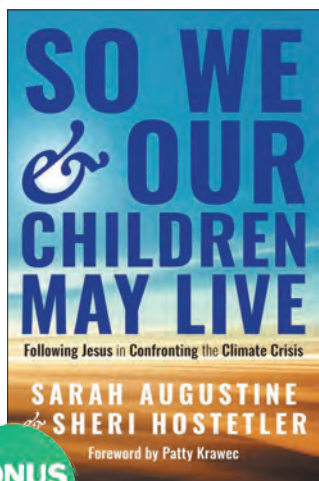
THE HAPPIEST MAN ON EARTH: THE BEAUTIFUL LIFE OF AN AUSCHWITZ SURVIVOR

In this riveting *New York Times* bestseller, Eddie Jaku shares his powerful memoir as a Holocaust survivor, paying tribute to those lost as he offers inspiring wisdom on living one's best possible life despite the most horrible circumstances. Jaku was a teenager when Nazi soldiers sent him to a concentration camp with thousands of other Jews across Germany. He spent seven years in Buchenwald and then Auschwitz, finally enduring a forced death march during the Third Reich's final days. Somehow, he found the will to survive and made himself a promise to smile every day in gratitude and to honor the six million Jews murdered by Hitler. **(V)**

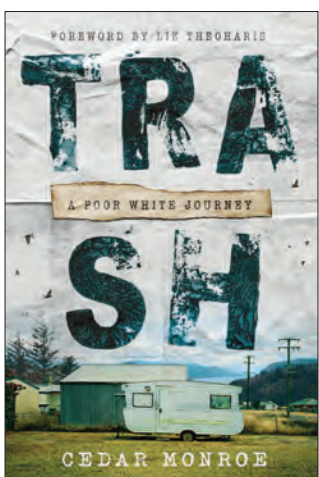


SO WE AND OUR CHILDREN MAY LIVE: FOLLOWING JESUS IN CONFRONTING THE CLIMATE CRISIS

In this impactful read, Sarah Augustine and Sheri Hostetler challenge people to open their eyes to the signs that all is not right with our planet. From extreme weather patterns to the pollutants that sour our soils and waterways, they urge readers to understand our world is in the midst of a larger ecological crisis. If change is to occur, we must look beyond the same systems that created those problems. With a call to worldwide decolonization, Augustine and Hostetler offer solutions for a better future by joining with Indigenous peoples to protect life and negotiate with decision-makers for sustainable change that follows Jesus.



TRASH: A POOR WHITE JOURNEY

Every day across the United States, 66 million poor white people pay the price for failing whiteness. In this sweeping debut, Monroe writes indelibly about and for poor white people: about unlearning the American dream, untangling from white supremacy, and working for liberation alongside other poor folks. With insight born of liberation theology, radical politics, and an even more radical hope, Monroe shares stories of a growing group of people who are rejecting the empty promises of white supremacy and embracing solidarity with other poor people, joining the resistance to the system killing us all. **(V)(L)**



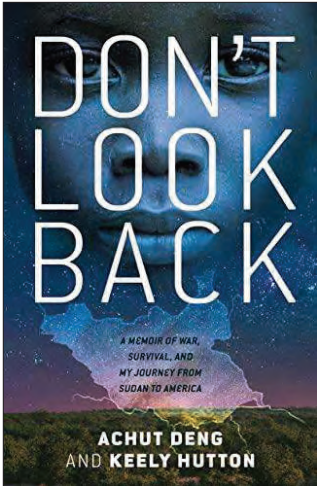
WHAT WE REMEMBER WILL BE SAVED:

A STORY OF REFUGEES AND THE THINGS THEY CARRY

STEPHANIE SALDAÑA

BROADLEAF BOOKS (2023)

Journalist and scholar Stephanie Saldaña, who lived in Syria before the war, sets out on a journey across nine countries to meet refugees and learn what they salvaged from the ruins when they escaped. In the narratives of six women and men, from Mt. Sinjar to Aleppo to Lesbos to Amsterdam, readers discover that the little things matter a great deal. Saldaña introduces us to a woman who saved her city in a dress, a musician who saved his stories in songs, and a couple who rebuilt their destroyed pharmacy even as the city around them fell apart. Together, they provide a window into a religiously diverse corner of the Middle East on the edge of unraveling, and the people keeping it alive with their stories. **(V)**



DON'T LOOK BACK: A MEMOIR OF WAR, SURVIVAL, AND MY JOURNEY FROM SUDAN TO AMERICA

ACHUT DENG & KEELY HUTTON

SQUARE FISH (2024)

After a deadly attack in South Sudan left six-year-old Achut Deng without a family, she lived in refugee camps for 10 years. Then a refugee relocation program gave her the opportunity to move to the United States. When asked why she should be given a chance to leave the camp, Achut simply told the interviewer: I want life. But starting a new life in a new country came with a different set of challenges, some of them equally deadly. Taught by the strong women in her life not to look back, Achut kept moving forward, overcoming one obstacle after another and facing each day with hope and faith in her future. **(V)**



SANCTUARY

PAOLA MENDOZA & ABBY SHER

NANCY PAULSEN BOOKS (2021)

In this near-future dystopian novel set in 2032 America, a young girl and her brother must escape a xenophobic government to find sanctuary. Sixteen-year-old Vali and her family have carved out a stable, happy life in small-town Vermont. When Deportation Forces raid their town, they are forced to flee across the country to her Tía Luna in California, a sanctuary state that is currently being walled off from the rest of the country. But when Vali's mother is detained before their journey even begins, Vali must carry on with her younger brother across the country to make it to safety before it's too late. **(V)**

Author Terry Catasús Jennings first came from Cuba to the United States in 1961, when she was 12 years old. In this award-winning children's book, she offers an inspiring, semi-autobiographical story of how immigrants can help each other find their footing in a new country. The book details how when Esperanza and her family arrive in the United States from Cuba, they rent a little house, *una casita*. It may be small, but they soon prove that there's room enough to share with a whole community. Together, they turn the house into a place where other new immigrants can help one another.

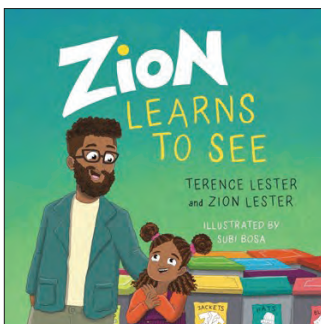


THESE OLIVE TREES: A PALESTINIAN FAMILY'S STORY

In this debut from author-illustrator Aya Ghanameh, readers embrace a bold tale of bitterness, hope, and the power of believing in a free and thriving future. It's 1967 in Nablus, Palestine, and Oraib loves the olive trees that grow outside the refugee camp where she lives. Each harvest, she and her mama pick the small fruits and stomp on them to release their golden oil. Olives have always tied her family to the land. But when war forces them to flee, Oraib makes a solemn promise to her beloved olive trees—their legacy will live on for generations to come.

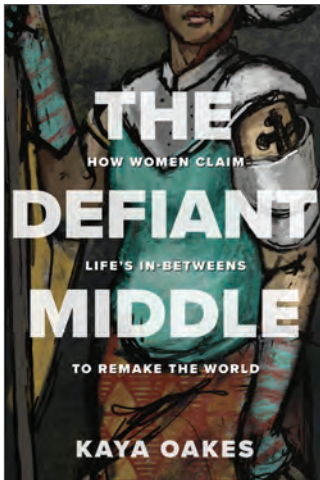


ZION LEARNS TO SEE

Join Zion and her dad on a life-changing Saturday in *Zion Learns to See*, by father-daughter duo Terence and Zion Lester. 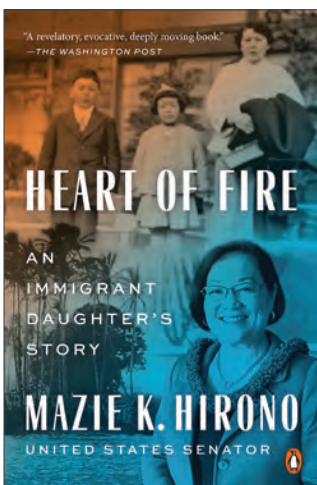
THE DEEPEST PLACE: SUFFERING AND THE FORMATION OF HOPE

In this intimate and inspiring life story, Mazie Hirono shares her experience as the first Asian-American woman and the only immigrant serving in the U.S. Senate. Raised on a rice farm in rural Japan, Hirono was seven years old when her mother left her abusive husband and sailed with her two elder children to Hawaii, crossing the Pacific in steerage in search of a better life. Though Hirono did not speak or read English when she entered first grade, she would go on to serve as a state representative and as Hawaii's lieutenant governor before winning election to Congress in 2006.

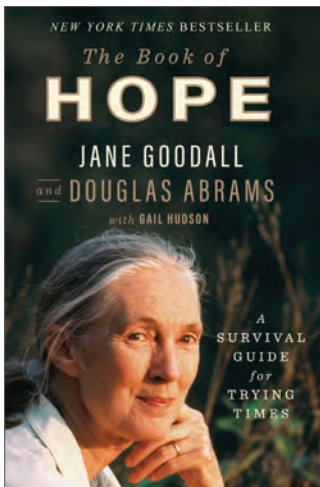


LEADING WELL: A BLACK WOMAN'S GUIDE TO WHOLISTIC, BARRIER-BREAKING LEADERSHIP

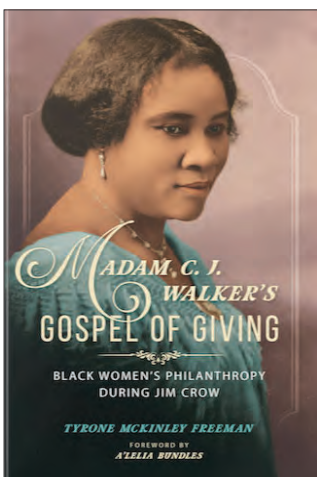
THE BOOK OF HOPE: A SURVIVAL GUIDE FOR TRYING TIMES

In this illuminating and dramatic biography, Tyrone McKinley Freeman reveals how beauty empire founder Madam C. J. Walker was celebrated as America's first self-made female millionaire in the early 1900s. But she was also devoted to an activist philanthropy aimed at empowering African Americans and challenging the injustices inflicted by Jim Crow. Here, Freeman highlights how giving shaped Walker's life before and after she became wealthy. Poor and widowed when she arrived in St. Louis in her twenties, Walker found mentorship among Black churchgoers and working Black women. Her adoption of faith, racial uplift, education, and self-help soon informed her dedication to assisting Black women's entrepreneurship, financial independence, and activism, establishing Walker as a foremother of African American philanthropy.

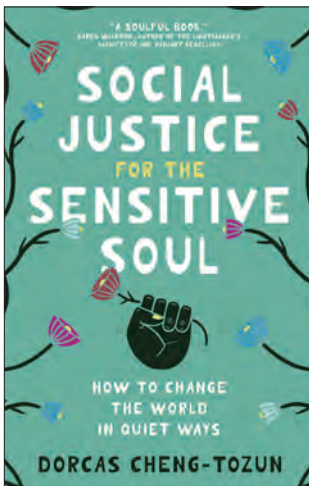


SEE NO STRANGER: A MEMOIR AND MANIFESTO OF REVOLUTIONARY LOVE

How do we love in a time of rage? How do we fix a broken world while not breaking ourselves? In this acclaimed work, Valarie Kaur—renowned Sikh activist, filmmaker, and civil rights lawyer—describes revolutionary love as a radical, joyful practice that extends in three directions: to others, to our opponents, and to ourselves. It enjoins us to see no stranger but instead, look at others and say: You are part of me I do not yet know. Starting from that place of wonder, the world begins to change. It is a practice that can transform a relationship, a community, a culture, and even a nation. Social justice work is often associated with raised voices and raised fists. But what does that work look like for the sensitive, who often don't feel comfortable battling in the trenches? Alongside inspiring, real-life examples of highly sensitive world-changers, author Dorcas Cheng-Tozun expands the possibilities of how to be a peacemaker and how to create a positive social impact, affirming the particular gifts and talents that sensitive souls offer to a hurting world. It also offers six possible pathways for sensitive types: connectors, creatives, record keepers, builders, equippers, and researchers.

From debut author Janae Marks comes a captivating story full of heart, as one courageous girl questions assumptions, searches for the truth, and does what she believes is right—even in the face of great opposition. When Zoe Washington gets a letter from her father, Marcus, on her 12th birthday, she doesn't know how to react. After all, she's never met or heard from Marcus, and he's been in prison for a terrible crime all these years. But Marcus says it's a crime he never committed, and her grandmother agrees. Soon, Zoe begins to learn about inequality in the criminal justice system, and she sets out to find the alibi witness who can prove his innocence.



MICHI CHALLENGES HISTORY: FROM FARM GIRL TO COSTUME DESIGNER TO RELENTLESS SEEKER OF THE TRUTH: THE LIFE OF MICH NISHIURA WEGLYN

KEN MOCHIZUKI

NORTON YOUNG READERS (2023)

This powerful biography explores the life of Michi Weglyn, the Japanese-American fashion designer whose activism fueled a movement for recognition of and reparations for America's World War II concentration camps. The daughter of Japanese immigrants, Michi was confined in Arizona's Gila River concentration camp during World War II. She later became a costume designer for Broadway and worked as the wardrobe designer for some of the most popular television personalities. In 1968, after a televised statement by the U.S. Attorney General that concentration camps in America never existed, Michi embarked on an eight-year solo quest to expose and account for the existence of the World War II camps where she and other Japanese Americans were imprisoned. Her research became a major catalyst for the passage of the Civil Liberties Act of 1988.



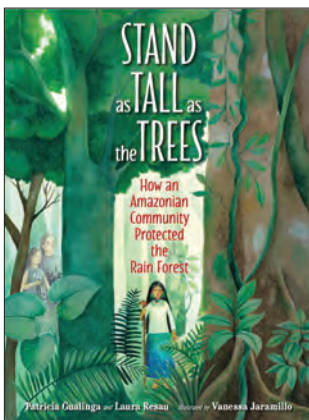

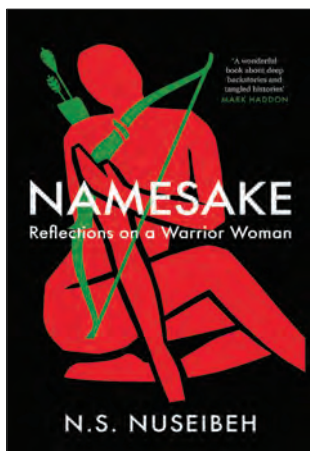


THE LIGHT SHE FEELS INSIDE

In this adaptation for young readers, *New York Times* bestselling author Dr. Jemar Tisby explains how everyday prejudice affects young people, what they can do to create social change, and how to maintain an anti-racist mindset and make a positive difference in the world. Through prose and poetry that gives voice to all the things we lose along the way, this gracious book helps readers ponder loss without judgment, remember what was, make meaning of memories, and reflect on what is yet to be to heal with hope. As Kang notes, you don't have to bury your pain, and you don't have to pretend you're over it just because the world thinks you should be.



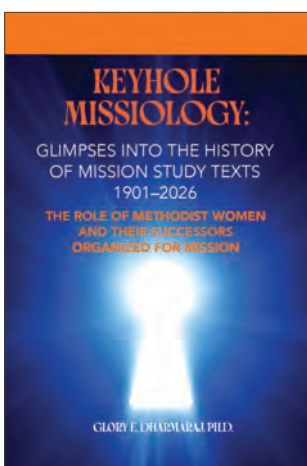

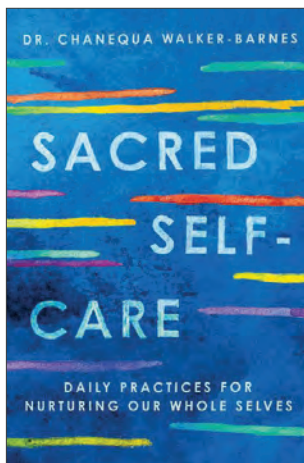


OUR UNFORMING: DE-WESTERNIZING SPIRITUAL FORMATION

Lee explores how Christian spiritual formation resources and teachings have primarily come from Western spiritual traditions, communicating that the white experience of God is the norm and authority. Instead, she proposes that the church needs a new way to engage in spiritual formation. To thrive in our increasingly diverse contexts, we need an unforming and reforming of our souls. As Lee argues, we need to unform the ways Western-dominated church leaders have understood formation, then reform—to imagine and create a more intricate spirituality that includes diverse experiences of God.

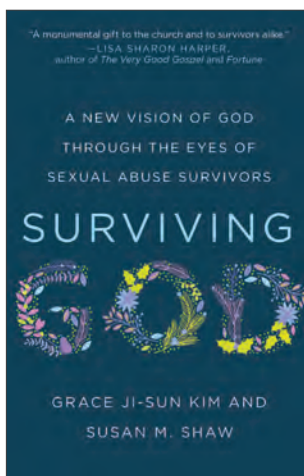


SACRED SELF-CARE: DAILY PRACTICES FOR NURTURING OUR WHOLE SELVES

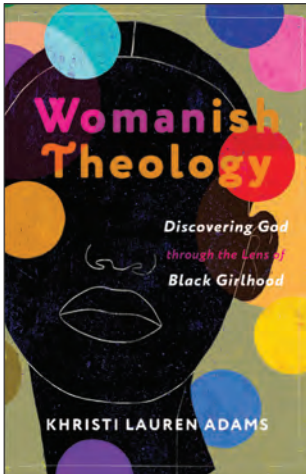


SURVIVING GOD: A NEW VISION OF GOD THROUGH THE EYES OF SEXUAL ABUSE SURVIVORS

WOMANISH THEOLOGY: DISCOVERING GOD THROUGH THE LENS OF BLACK GIRLHOOD

KHRISTI LAUREN ADAMS

BRAZOS PRESS (2024)

In *Womanish Theology*, Khristi Lauren Adams reflects on her faith experiences over the years, inviting readers to learn from a new perspective and guiding them to a deeper understanding of their spirituality. This groundbreaking book introduces a new branch of theological thought Adams calls “womanish.” “Womanish,” remembers Adams, is a term Black mothers used for young girls as they grew more interested in doing grown-up things. Adams draws on her own life story as well as the life stories of other Black girls to explore theological concepts such as Scripture, theodicy, salvation, prayer, neighborly love, and the image of God.

God With Us invites youth and their leaders to explore Scripture with curiosity and openness. Rather than viewing biblical figures as unreachable heroes, participants discover how God is present in both the extraordinary and the everyday. Each session offers fresh insights, challenges assumptions, and encourages honest reflection. Rooted in conversation and community, the curriculum emphasizes shared exploration over right answers. Youth are invited to listen for God's presence—in the stories of Scripture and in their own lives—fostering growth, connection, and meaningful dialogue in eight one-hour sessions that extend beyond the page and into daily experience.

This Newbery Honor Book is a hopeful novel in verse about an Indian-American girl whose life is turned upside down when her mother is diagnosed with leukemia. Reha feels torn between two worlds: school, where she's the only Indian-American student, and home, with her family's traditions and holidays. But Reha's parents don't understand why she's conflicted—they only notice when Reha doesn't meet their strict expectations. Then Reha finds out that her Amma is sick. Really sick. Reha, who dreams of becoming a doctor even though she can't stomach the sight of blood, becomes determined to make her Amma well again. She'll be the “perfect daughter” if it means saving Amma's life.



A PRAYER FOR OUR COUNTRY: WORDSTO UNITE AND INSPIRE HOPE

BARRY BLACK

ZONDERKIDZ (2022)

Authored by U.S. Senate Chaplain Barry Black, this colorful children's book helps kids learn to thank God for America while also exploring the ways we can model God's love to support our country's citizens, heal hurts that divide us, and look to a stronger, united future. In this prayer for children based on wisdom from his almost two decades of daily praying over the U.S. Senate, Black offers needed and inspiring text to help the next generation grow stronger in faith and forward America's dream.



BROWN BABY JESUS

DORENA WILLIAMSON

WATERBROOK (2022)

This unique retelling of the Nativity story features Jesus as a darker-skinned baby in a story that's rich with Scripture and a multicultural weaving of love. In this beautiful picture book, Jesus' mother Mary spins wool into yarn and remembers the many people in Jesus' lineage. Like Moses, brown baby Jesus would be a deliverer. Like Rahab, brown baby Jesus would save his people from destruction. Like David, brown baby Jesus would rule as a great king. Like the colorful threads that make up a beautiful cloth, *Brown Baby Jesus* brings together the characters and stories leading to Jesus.



MISSION U: EXPERIENCING EMMANUEL

AMY BETH JONES

UNITED WOMEN IN FAITH (2026)

Experiencing Emmanuel invites children to explore and name God's presence in their lives. Grounded in the belief that faith is a lifelong journey, the curriculum helps children discover how stories from Scripture shape identity and community. Guided by the Wesleyan quadrilateral—Scripture, tradition, reason, and experience—each of the eight one-hour sessions includes reflection journals, sacred story retellings, testimonies of faith, and shared hands-on activities. 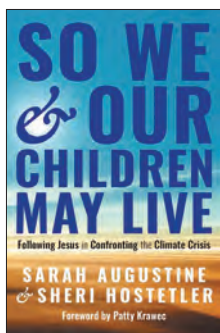

We encourage you to read and discuss these books with others and to facilitate conversations that include both your United Women in Faith sisters and your broader community. SO WE AND OUR CHILDREN MAY LIVE: FOLLOWING JESUS IN CONFRONTING THE CLIMATE CRISIS SARAH AUGUSTINE & SHERI HOSTETLER



So We and Our Children May Live: Following Jesus in Confronting the Climate Crisis by Sarah Augustine and Sheri Hostetler connects to one of our core justice priorities: climate justice and justice energy for all.

#SAYHERNAME: BLACK WOMEN'S STORIES OF POLICE VIOLENCE AND PUBLIC SILENCE

KIMBERLÉ CRENSHAW & THE AFRICAN AMERICAN POLICY FORUM



#SayHerName: Black Women's Stories of Police Violence and Public Silence connects to one of our core justice priorities: ending mass incarceration and the criminalization of communities of color.

Optional Preparation Activity: More Black women have been killed by police since this book was published in 2023. This includes Sonya Massey, who was killed in her own home and whose death briefly ignited national outrage. By the time you read this, the roll will likely be longer still. Some of the names may be familiar, but many are likely to have slipped by unnoticed, receiving minimal media attention. In preparation for this discussion, ask participants or group leaders to make a list of the names of any additional Black women killed by police since the time this book was published.

Discussion Questions

1. Throughout this book, we hear the stories of Black women who were killed at the hands of police, their stories told through the testimonies of their mothers and sisters—the women who knew them most intimately. Whose story struck you most? Why?
2. Fran Garrett, Michelle Cusseaux's mother, made the brave and striking decision to march her daughter's casket to Phoenix City Hall. Review the story (pages 6, 10, and 11) and picture (page 10) and discuss the meaning and impact of this decision.
3. Professor Crenshaw describes a stand-up/sit-down audience participation activity she uses to illustrate a broad social pattern (pages 11-13). Discuss what this activity and its outcome demonstrate. Do you think the same thing would happen at a United Women in Faith* meeting? Why or why not? If yes, what can we do as member-leaders of United Women in Faith to change this pattern?

*If you are not currently a member of United Women in Faith, substitute in the name of your church or community organization.

4. In what ways have Black women's experiences and needs been deprioritized in feminist movements? In antiracist movements? What role do organizations like the African American Policy Forum play in changing those harmful patterns? How does Crenshaw's intersectional work try to create more space for justice-seeking efforts that prioritize the needs of Black women and girls? Who benefits from demeaning or demonizing this intersectional work? Who benefits if intersectional organizing work is a success?
5. Did you know Fannie Lou Hamer was a victim of nonconsensual sterilization? Why does the author think this story is not more widely shared (pages 82-83)? How can we educate ourselves about silenced or stolen histories, especially as they relate to race- and gender-justice in the United States?



6. Gina Best's daughter, India Jasmine Kager, was murdered by a SWAT team while India's infant child was in the back of her car. Gina Best shares her story at the start of Chapter 3, "Disposable Lives." At the end of her story, she writes:

I envision that, when we say her name and we remember, we amplify our beautiful daughters and sisters and queens. I like to imagine India answering back. I like to imagine every last one of our babies, our loved ones, answering back. And I'll imagine a world where not only are we saying their names, but you all are doing it too, where we're not speaking against the silence. Tell someone. Speak their names. It emboldens us. It gives us strength and encouragement in those very lonely times, because there are no words to articulate the level of pain that we live with. It's off the spectrum. But we're here. We're here. We're gonna do something about this, sisters. It's starting with us. And we won't quit. (Page 100)

Read this passage together and reflect on its meaning. Where is the heartbreak in this passage? Where is the hope? What is the charge and call to action, for each of us?

7. The police officers who killed Breonna Taylor in her own home were doing so via a "no-knock" warrant—a judicial order that authorizes police to enter someone's home without warning and without identifying themselves" (page 103). No-knock warrants were also in use when Aiyana Stanley-Jones, Tarika Wilson, Kathryn Johnston, and Alberta Spruill were killed, each in her own home. Why are no-knock warrants so dangerous? Does your community still allow no-knock warrants?
8. The Attorney General of Kentucky announced his decision not to prosecute the police who killed Breonna Taylor on September 23, 2020. On September 23, 1955, an all-white jury acquitted the men who lynched Emmett Till, Mamie Till-Mobley's son. Why is this an important historical parallel? What are the similarities and differences? (See Chapter 3, "Disposable Lives," especially pages 107-111.) Crenshaw writes, "In the years following [Breonna Taylor's] death, the question is whether her death and the failure to hold anyone accountable for it will bring the same shift in public consciousness as Till's" (page 110). What do you think? Did Breonna Taylor's death shift public consciousness in the same way as Emmett Till's? Why or why not?
9. Rhanda Dormeus, mother of Korryn Gaines, reflects, "How will I ever be able to explain or show or teach my grandchildren how wonderful their mother was? Even with all the footage and pictures, they'll never be able to feel her embrace. Her hugs were different than my hugs, her kisses were different than my kisses" (pages 130-131). What are the intergenerational impacts of these women's tragic deaths? What is forever lost, to mothers and children, when a woman dies at the hands of police violence?
10. Several of the women whose stories are shared were killed by police sent in response to a mental health crisis call. How might these tragic stories have ended differently if there were differently trained first responders like social workers, nurses, EMTs, a crisis response team, or peer support mental health specialists?



11. Chapter 4, “Building Community,” describes some of the #SayHerName gathering rituals in detail and expresses the belief that rituals are important to the work of #SayHerName. What do you think about this? How have you seen the practice of rituals—both inside and outside the church—to encourage social justice, remembrance, and healing? What additional rituals may be needed?
12. In Chapter 6, “Art Activism,” the authors describe the use of different forms of art to remember and make social change in the #SayHerName movement. How does art connect with justice-seeking? If you’re an artist and/or an activist, how do you see the connections in your practice?
13. In the epilogue, “Brokenhearted,” we learn about the negative impact these tragic losses have on the surviving mothers’ and sisters’ health and well-being. Did these impacts surprise you? Why or why not? What might we do, as individuals or as communities, to better support survivors? (*Note: If you’re looking for practical ideas for how you can help the Mothers Network and/or the #SayHerName movement, check out this resource: aapf.org/shnadvocate.)*)
14. Before her death, Vickie McAdory, auntie-momma of India Beatty, said this: “I refuse. I refuse as a woman, I refuse as a Black woman, I refuse as a human being, a citizen of this world, to shut up any longer. Especially when it comes to the senseless and vicious murders of our babies” (pages 285–286). Discuss this quote. Why is this refusal an important spiritual practice? What do we learn from the Mothers Network’s refusal to be silent, the insistence that they will always #SayHerName? What silence(s) are we called to refuse?

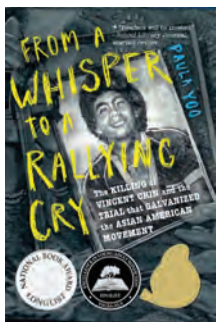
Optional Concluding Ritual: Consider closing your book discussion with a ritual of your own, a time for focused prayer and intentional remembrance. This ritual could be as simple as lighting a candle and reading aloud the names in the “In Memoriam” section, or as elaborate as you choose.

FROM A WHISPER TO A RALLYING CRY: THE KILLING OF VINCENT CHIN AND THE TRIAL THAT GALVANIZED THE ASIAN AMERICAN MOVEMENT

PAULA YOO



This award-winning book examines the killing of Vincent Chin, a Chinese American man beaten to death at the hands of two white men amid much anti-Asian American sentiment in their Detroit community. Chin's killers pled guilty to manslaughter and received only a \$3,000 fine and three years' probation. The lenient sentence sparked outrage. The protests that followed led to a federal civil rights trial—the first involving a crime against an Asian American person—and galvanized what came to be known as the Asian American movement.

From a Whisper to a Rallying Cry: The Killing of Vincent Chin and the Trial that Galvanized the Asian American Movement by Paula Yoo shares an important and often overlooked part of our racial justice history in the United States of America. It is a Norton Young Readers book, appropriate for both high school youth and adults. This is a very powerful text for intergenerational discussion, which, is a powerful tool in the work of understanding our history more fully and building a stronger future, together.

Please note: The book contains violence and graphic language, as it describes the horrific murder of Vincent Chin, the subsequent trial, and the aftermath of those historic events. This content is not gratuitous; it is necessary to explain the facts of what happened. As a matter of courtesy, you will want to make sure any participants know what to expect upfront. We also strongly encourage you to do your best to ensure that youth readers, especially, have adequate support to process the information they are learning and the feelings that it may bring up. Please check in with your participants, especially your youth participants.

Discussion Questions Appropriate for Intergenerational Conversation

1. Were you familiar with Vincent Chin's story before you read this book? If so, where did you first learn about his story? If not, why do you think you haven't heard it before now?
2. Review the timeline of events on pages 315–318. Identify when on the timeline you were born. Were you alive at the time of Vincent Chin's murder? If so, how old were you? (Note: This question may be specifically relevant for intergenerational groups.)
3. Why was Vincent Chin targeted? How did his murder connect to broader racial injustice targeting Asian Americans in the 1980s?
4. What do you think about the verdict(s) in the trials for the killing of Vincent Chin? Was this what you expected when you first began the book, or did you expect a different outcome?
5. The title, *From a Whisper to a Rallying Cry*, suggests a progression from silence to collective action. In what ways does Vincent Chin's story reflect this transformation, and how do you see this echoed in other justice movements?



6. Paula Yoo writes:

On the night of June 19, 1982, when Officer Morris Cotton was filling out his police report about the killing of Vincent Chin, the form contained only two boxes to mark the victim's race.
White.

Black.

Cotton had no choice but to check the "White" box.

In 1982 the topic of race in the United States centered on white and Black. Asian Americans and others were often not even considered part of the conversation. (Page 124)

Who is harmed when society thinks of race only in terms of "white" and "Black"? What role did American Citizens for Justice and Helen Zia play in changing the conversation about race in America? What work still needs to be done to ensure that Asian American perspectives are fully included in conversations about race?

7. Paula Yoo writes of Vincent Chin's mother, Lily Chin, "Lily's fury and willingness to speak bluntly about what happened to her son defied the racist stereotypes of Asian women as quiet and submissive" (page 146). How would you characterize Lily Chin's leadership? How did Lily Chin's leadership in the face of overwhelming loss touch or inspire you? What did you feel and think as you followed her story?
8. A powerful new Asian American Coalition came together to fight for justice for Vincent Chin with American Citizens for Justice. American Citizens for Justice, in turn, worked to educate others about Vincent Chin's murder and the broader context of racism targeting Asian Americans, successfully gaining the support of still more organizations, including African American, Arab American, Latinx, and Italian American groups, as well as various faith communities. Why was this work of coalition building so important? What do you think is easiest/hardest about building coalitions for justice, then and today?
9. Helen Zia was present at the Golden Star meeting on March 20, 1983, as a journalist documenting events. The gathered lawyers were not hopeful that change was possible. "The pen felt heavy in Zia's hands as she wrote the words, 'There's nothing we can do.'" Then, there are two turning point moments as two powerful leaders speak up: Lily Chin, and then Helen Zia. Find their words (page 82) and read them aloud. Ask yourselves: What do you think each of these women may have been thinking and feeling at this time? How did their words change the dynamic in the room—and, with it, the course of American history? Do you think each woman knew the impact her words would have at the time? What are you thinking and feeling as you hear their words today?
10. Have you ever had such a moment where you spoke up to say, like Helen Zia, "This is not okay," about racial injustice in your community? If so, what happened? Why is it important to talk about racism and racial justice, even when doing so is unpopular or difficult?



11. Jarod Lew's story is told in interstitial chapters throughout the book, offering a parallel personal journey. What struck you most from Jarod Lew's journey of discovering this history and its intimate connection points to his own life? Why do you think his family had kept this story from him? Does your family talk openly about experiences of racial violence or keep these histories unspoken? Do you like that, or do you wish it was different? Why?
12. Vincent Chin's story is full of powerful Asian American women leaders who stood up for justice, including Lily Chin, Helen Zia, and Liza Chan. What leadership lessons did you learn from each of these women? What unique gifts did each woman bring to the struggle for justice for Vincent Chin?
13. Paula Yoo writes:

When Vincent's mother Lily Chin said, "My son's soul will never rest," she was right.

But not for the reasons she thought. Today Vincent Chin lives on as a symbol against hatred and racism.

His soul is not yet ready to rest. (Page 302)

Do you think Vincent Chin's legacy lives on in contemporary antiracism work? If so, how?

14. Is the story of Vincent Chin's murder and other important events in Asian American history taught in your community's public schools? If not, why not? Are they uplifted from your church's pulpits, pews, Christian education settings, and Sunday schools? If not, why not?

Queridas lectoras de Mujeres Unidas en la Fe:

Como les sucede a muchos, en estos días mi atención se dirige hacia muchas direcciones diferentes. Las demandas comunes del trabajo y la familia están siempre presentes, mientras que los titulares de las noticias aparecen tan rápido que es difícil seguirles el ritmo. Las tendencias culturales de este tiempo nos invitan a pasar rápidamente de una historia a otra, a degustar la información y asimilar los diferentes extractos, tanto sociales como espirituales, dando un rápido clic sin profundizar demasiado. Ante tanto desorden mental causado por las propuestas de los medios sociales que atrapan nuestra atención, la elección de leer un libro (o muchos libros!) completa y cuidadosamente, como sugiere el Programa de Lectura, parece casi contracultural; y tal vez eso sea exactamente lo que necesitamos.

En mi opinión, uno de los grandes beneficios de la lectura es la invitación a pensar lenta y deliberadamente, a ocuparse de una idea a la vez, a sumergirse en el mundo del autor y a estar completamente presente. A veces me encuentro a mí misma asintiendo con entusiasmo, casi suspirando de alivio cuando alguien más expresa lo que siento que siempre he sabido, pero que nunca he podido expresar con palabras. A veces, me siento desafiada, perpleja, incluso irritada y confundida por las nuevas ideas que van en contra de mis suposiciones previas y crean fricción interna. Es más fácil aceptar la comodidad que la inquietud, pero ambas son útiles en el camino del crecimiento personal.

La historia del Programa de Lectura es larga y loable. Audrie E. Reber en *Women United for Mission: A History of the Women's Society of World Service of the Evangelical United Brethren Church* (Mujeres Unidas en Misión: Historia de la Sociedad de Mujeres de Servicio Mundial de la Iglesia Evangélica de los Hermanos Unidos), 1946-1968, describe en detalle “el Curso de Lectura” de la organización de mujeres de la EUB (por sus siglas en inglés), una de las iglesias que se unió para formar la actual Iglesia Metodista Unida. Ella escribe: “Las mujeres siempre fueron animadas a leer tanto para saber más acerca de las áreas de misión de las cuales la iglesia es responsable como para entender a las personas y preocuparse por ellas” (46). Las mujeres de entonces, al igual que las/los participantes del Programa de Lectura de hoy, no solo estaban involucradas en la lectura superficial. La lista del Curso de Lectura de 1947 incluía *Dachau Sermons* (Los sermones de Dachau) y *Beyond Prejudice: A Story of the Church and Japanese Americans* (Más allá del prejuicio: Una historia de la iglesia y de los japoneses-estadounidenses), entre muchos otros libros desafiantes e importantes. En 1968, los títulos incluían clásicos como *Disciplines of the Christian Life* (Disciplinas de la vida cristiana) de Georgia Harkness y también documentos innovadores como *Church Women United for Peace* (Mujeres de la Iglesia Unidas por la Paz) del Consejo Nacional de Iglesias. Por supuesto, ninguno de los títulos del Programa de Lectura 2026 sería conocido para el grupo de lectores de 1947 o 1968; el Programa de Lectura, de ese entonces y ahora, está comprometido con dar a conocer el trabajo contemporáneo, pero nuestro propósito y postura ciertamente les resultaría familiar.

El Programa de Lectura, heredero de una poderosa tradición, nos ofrece un regalo profundo para mediados de los 2020-2030. En una época en la que se nos anima cada vez más a aprender, e incluso a pensar en intervalos cortos dominados por la alta tecnología y la poca atención, las prácticas que promueve el Programa de Lectura ofrecen un antídoto bienvenido y necesario, una especie de consuelo espiritual. Leer es tanto aleccionador como esperanzador. Es reconocer que no lo sabemos todo y que todavía tenemos mucho que aprender unos de otros, a pesar de nuestras muchas diferencias. También es redescubrir de manera continua la increíble amplitud y profundidad del mundo que nos rodea y del mundo que hay en nuestro interior.

Lea con atención, profundidad y cuidado. Saboree el mensaje. Considere tomar notas o dar una caminata de oración para reflexionar sobre lo que lee. Como Jacob y el ángel, luche con el texto, no solo para estar de acuerdo o en desacuerdo, para saber si le “gusta” o no, sino con el propósito devoto de encontrar la bendición: la sabiduría que Dios quiere que reciba.

Si puede, organice reuniones locales para leer con otras personas. La comprensión que cosechamos de las perspectivas de los demás puede ser tan valiosa como las palabras en las páginas. Aprender juntos y escucharnos mutuamente puede ser un encuentro sagrado. No se necesita ser miembro de Mujeres Unidas en la Fe para participar en el Programa de Lectura; por lo tanto, considere presentar oportunidades para “Leer juntos” a quienes no son miembros y a quienes pueden llegar a serlo. Si reunirse en su iglesia resulta difícil, considere un lugar de reunión no convencional, como una biblioteca pública, un centro comunitario o una cafetería. Si desea desafiarse aún más y construir una experiencia intergeneracional, considere asociarse con un grupo de jóvenes, un campus de la universidad local, un centro para personas mayores o una comunidad de retiro. Muchas mujeres están hambrientas de hermandad y de un buen libro. Mujeres Unidas en la Fe puede ofrecer ambas cosas a través de su liderazgo local.

Gracias al increíble equipo de más de 175 evaluadores voluntarios y al maravilloso Comité del Programa de Lectura (presidido por Kelly G. Loeb), cuyo trabajo fiel hizo posible el Programa de Lectura 2026. Que sea una bendición para tu camino.

Luego, su recomendación es revisada y aprobada por el Comité de Gobernanza de la Junta Directiva.

Desafortunadamente, no podemos anticipar cuáles contenidos puedan resultar perturbadores para cada uno de nuestros lectores, ya que cada uno es único y traemos nuestro conjunto particular de experiencias. Si comienza a leer un libro y descubre que es demasiado para usted en algún momento determinado, entonces, por supuesto, le animamos a practicar el autocuidado y a dejar el libro de lado.

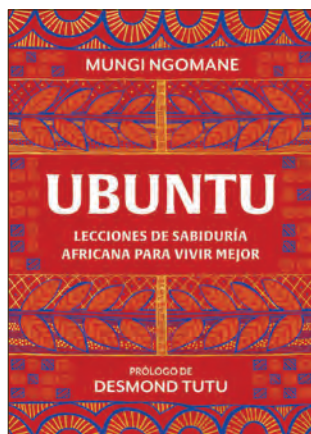
LEE & LOW BOOKS (2022)

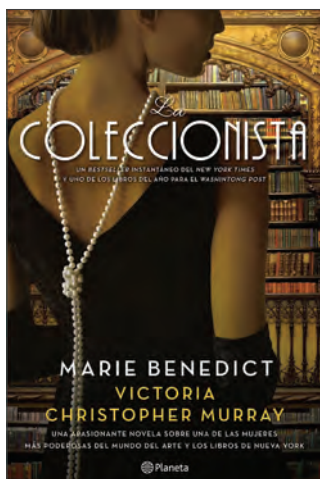

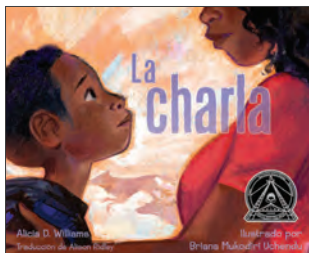

독서 프로그램의 독자 여러분께,

요즘 많은 사람들이 그러하듯이 제 시선도 다양한 관심사에 잇닿아 있습니다. 뉴스 헤드라인은 따라잡기 어려울 정도로 빠르게 변화하고 있으며, 일 그리고 가족과의 규칙적인 일상도 여전히 계속되고 있습니다. 현 시대의 문화적 흐름은 우리로 하여금 이 이야기에서 저 이야기로 빠르게 쫓아다니게 합니다. 우리는 사회적이고 영적 정보에 대해 선별된 기사나 자극적으로 선정된 주장을 탐색하는 일에 분주하여 깊은 생각을 못하고 있습니다. 많은 네온 불 빛들처럼 우리의 시선을 잡는 정신적 분주함 속에서, 독서 프로그램의 제안에 따라 꼼꼼하고 주의 깊게 책(또는 여러 권의 책들)을 읽으려는 선택은 요즘의 문화에 완전히 거스르려는 일처럼 보입니다. 이 일이야말로 바로 우리에게 꼭 필요한 일입니다.

제가 볼 때 독서가 주는 최고의 선물은 천천히 그리고 꼼꼼하게 생각하고, 한 번에 한 가지 생각에만 몰두하고, 저자의 세계 속에 내가 푹 빠져 완전하게 존재감을 가질 수 있게 한다는 점입니다. 내가 알고 있었지만 말로 풀어낼 수 없었던 것 같은 것을 다른 누군가가 군더더기 없이 글로 표현해 주었다는 사실에 이따금씩 안도의 숨을 내쉬면서, 내적 동의의 표시로 열렬히 고개를 끄덕이는 나를 발견하곤 합니다. 때로는 내가 이미 알고 있던 이해를 자극하는 새로운 아이디어에 의해 도전을 받기도 하고, 당혹스럽다 못해 초초하게 되기도 하며, 혼란을 느끼는 나를 발견하기도 합니다. 동요되기 보다 안정을 받아들이는 것이 훨씬 쉽지만, 이 두 가지는 개인의 성장 과정에 유익합니다.

독서 프로그램의 역사는 오래되었고 자랑할 만합니다. 오드리 레버(Audrie E. Reber)는 「선교를 위하여 하나된 여성들: 복음주의 연합 형제 교회의 세계 봉사를 위한 여성회, 1946-1968」라는 책에서 오늘날의 연합감리교회(UMC)와 연합했던 교단이었던 복음주의 연합 형제 교회(EUB)의 여성조직의 “독서 과정(The Reading Course)”에 대하여 자세히 소개합니다. 그녀는 “여성들은 교회가 책임을 지고 있는 선교지역에 대한 이해를 더 많이 하고, 그들이 선교지역 사람들에게 대한 이해와 돌봄을 더 잘 하기 위하여 항상 독서가 격려되었다.”(46쪽)고 기록하고 있습니다. 오늘날의 독서 프로그램에 참여하는 여성들과 마찬가지로, 그 당시 여성들도 수박 겉핥기식의 독서를 하지 않았습니다. 1947년 독서 과정 목록 중 매우 도전적이고 중요한 책들로는 「다카우 수용소에서의 설교(Dachau Sermons)」, 「편견을 넘어(Beyond Prejudice)」, 그리고 「교회와 일본계 미국인들의 이야기」가 포함되어 있습니다. 1968년 독서목록으로는 클래식인 조지아 하크니스(Georgia Harkness)의 「기독교 삶의 훈련」과 당시로서는 최신 문서였던 미국교회협의회(NCC)의 평화를 위한 교회 여성 연합(Church Women United for Peace)이 포함되어 있습니다. 물론, 2026년 독서 프로그램의 책 제목들은 1947년이나 1968년의 독자들에게는 낯설게 보일 수 있습니다. 그 때나 지금이나 독서 프로그램은 시대에 따른 사역들을 향상시키기 위해 애쓰고 있기 때문에, 우리의 목적이나 자세는 여전히 변함 없이 느껴질 것입니다.

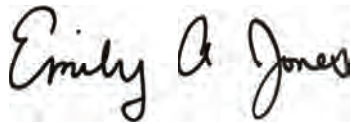
강력한 전통의 상속자인 독서 프로그램은 2020년대 중반을 살아가는 우리에게 뜻 깊은 선물을 안겨줍니다. 고도의 기술로 집중력이 위협을 받고 있는 시대, 달리 말하면, 배우는 일과 생각하는 일조차도 격려를 받는 시대 속에서 독서 프로그램의 실천은 환영할 만한 필수 해독제이자 영적 위로를 제공합니다. 독서는 겸손하게 되고 희망에 차오르게도 합니다. 우리는 아직 모든 것을 알지 못하지만, 서로의 다름을 통해 서로서로 더 많은 것을 배울 것이라는 점을 인정합니다. 또한 독서는 우리를 둘러싼 세계와 우리 안에 있는 세계에 대하여 믿을 수 없을 정도로 광대함과 깊이가 있다는 것을 계속해서 재발견하게 합니다.

책을 깊이 있고, 주의 깊게, 그리고 집중하면서 읽으십시오. 메시지를 맛보십시오. 여러분이 읽은 것에 대한 성찰을 저널로 쓰거나 기도의 산책을 해 보십시오. 야곱이 천사와 씨름했던 것처럼 책의 내용과 씨름해 보십시오. 이것은 동의인가 반대인가 또는 좋아하는가 싫어하는가에 대한 씨름이 아닙니다. 하나님께서 당신에게 주시기를 원하는 지혜 즉 축복을 기도하는 마음으로 발견하려는 목적으로 책과 씨름해 보십시오.

할 수 있다면 다른 사람들과 독서를 위한 지역 모임을 만들어 보십시오. 우리가 서로의 시선들을 통해 수확할 수 있는 통찰력들은 책에 있는 글만큼 귀합니다. 함께 배우고 서로를 경청하는 일은 거룩한 만남이 될 수 있습니다. 연합감리교회 여선교회 회원이 아니어도 독서 프로그램에 참여할 수 있습니다. 그러므로 연합감리교회 여선교회 회원이 아닌 여성들이나 앞으로 회원이 될 수 있는 여성들에게도 “함께 읽기”의 기회를 개방하는 것을 생각해 보십시오. 교회에서 모임이 여의치 않다면, 공공 도서관, 커뮤니티 센터, 또는 커피숍과 같이 기존에 모임을 갖지 않았던 장소들도 고려해 보십시오. 한걸음 더 나아가 여러분이 모든 세대들과 경험을 쌓고 싶다면 청소년 그룹, 대학 캠퍼스, 시니어 센터, 혹은 은퇴자 모임과 협력하는 것을 생각해 보십시오. 많은 여성들은 자매됨과 좋은 책에 대하여 간절히 원하고 있습니다. 연합감리교회 여선교회는 여러분의 지역교회 임원회를 통해 이 두 가지를 도울 수 있습니다.

2026년 독서 프로그램을 실행할 수 있도록 섬겨 준 175명 이상의 멋진 자원 평가자 팀과 켈리 로오프(Kelly G. Loeb) 위원장과 독서 프로그램 위원회의 놀라운 사역에 깊이 감사드립니다. 여러분의 독서 프로그램의 여정에 축복이 있기를 기원합니다.

독서 프로그램의 책들은 공공 도서관이나, 동네 서점 또는 온라인 상점을 통해 구할 수 있습니다. 여러분은 올 해 독서 프로그램의 책을 여선교회 홈페이지 온라인 서점 bookshop.org/shop/uwfaith에서도 구매할 수 있습니다. 여선교회는 이렇게 구매하는 모든 도서 판매 수익금의 10%를 선교기금으로 사용합니다.



● 개인으로 독서 프로그램에 참여하면 수료증은 어떻게 받을 수 있나요?

독서 프로그램 계획 I, II, III, 또는 IV를 마치십시오. 이 도서목록 끝에 있는 독서 프로그램 보고서를 작성해 주십시오. 독서 프로그램 보고서를 작성한 후에 지방회나 연회 독서 프로그램 담당자에게 제출해 주십시오. 독서 보고 마감일을 포함한 자세한 문의 사항에 대하여 지방회나 연회 임원회에게 연락하십시오. 독서 계획서를 작성하고 정해진 마감 기한에 독서 보고서를 제출한 모든 여선교회 회원들과 친구들은 독서 프로그램 수료증을 받을 수 있습니다.



● 어떻게 그룹으로 독서 프로그램을 진행할 수 있나요?

독서 프로그램은 여선교회 정규 모임이나 신입 회원을 위한 모임에 최고의 내용을 제공합니다. 직접 만나거나 온라인으로 함께 하는 책 읽기는 강력한 공통분모를 형성할 수 있게 합니다. 독서 프로그램의 책들은 여성 회원들이 영적으로 성장하고, 리더십 역량을 강화하고, 좀 더 효과적인 사회적 행동, 지역공동체 형성과 공공 서비스를 위한 능력을 갖추도록 특별히 선별되었습니다. 한 권의 책을 함께 읽고 토론하는 일은 서로 낯설어 하는 여선교회 회원들에게 의미 있는 대화를 쉽게 시작하게 합니다. 이 일은 신입 회원과 만나서 자매됨을 형성하기 위한 초대가 될 수도 있습니다. 아직 연합감리교회 여선교회 회원이 아닌 여성들과 독서 프로그램 토론의 개최를 고려해 보십시오. 교회가 아닌 공공 도서관이나 커피숍 또는 공원에서 모임을 갖는 독서 프로그램 모임을 찾아보세요. 하루 종일 풀타임으로 일하거나 힘든 돌봄의 책임을 지고 있는 여성들을 비롯해 다양한 삶의 상황에 처해 있는 여선교회 회원들과의 모임의 가능성을 시도해 보십시오. 여러분은 독서 프로그램의 책에 대한 자신의 토론 질문들을 만들 수도 있고, 도서 목록 끝에 있는 자료에서 사용 수 있는 올 해의 보너스 책들에 대한 토론 질문들의 예들로 시작할 수도 있습니다.



● 어떤 자료들이 모든 세대를 위한 배움을 지원하나요?

● 책들은 어떻게 선별되었나요?

한 해 동안 수많은 자원 봉사자들이 독서 프로그램을 위해 잠정적으로 선정된 도서를 읽고 평가하였습니다. 평가를 위해 검토 중인 각각의 책은 적어도 세 명에 의해 개별적으로 평가를 받았습니다. 독서 프로그램 위원회는 이 평가들을 기초로 활용하고, 전체 도서 목록과의 균형을 고려하여 추천 도서를 정하였습니다. 이렇게 선정된 도서들은 이사회 운영 위원회에 의해 평가와 승인을 받았습니다.



● 책 추천은 어떻게 할 수 있나요?

여러분이 오디오북을 사용하는 것이 독서를 하기에 좀 더 편하고 접근하기 쉽다면 얼마든지 그렇게 해도 됩니다.



● 독서 프로그램 책들 중에 문제가 있나요? 어떤 내용인지 어떻게 알 수 있나요?

독서 프로그램은 폭력과 잠재적으로 자극적인 내용을 포함하여 오늘 우리 사회의 어려운 경험들과 있는 그대로 씨름하고 고양시킴으로써 영적으로 자양분이 되도록 계획되었습니다. 표시가 가능한 곳에는, 책 내용에 대한 잠재적인 혼동 가능성에 대한 구별 표시를 위한 꼬리표(flag)를 붙였습니다. 예를 들어, 시각적 폭력은 **(V)**, 노골적인 성적 내용은 **(S)**, 그리고/또는 저속한 언어가 있는 경우는 **(L)**로 표기했습니다. 이것은 여러분이 이러한 책들을 읽지 못하게 하려는 것이 아니라, 여러분에게 폭력과 자극에 대한 예상을 준비하게 함으로서 정확한 정보를 알고 선택할 수 있도록 도와려는 것입니다. 아쉽게도 우리는 자신만의 개성과 고유한 경험을 가지고 있는 각각의 독자에게 불쾌감을 줄 수 있는 내용 전부를 예측할 수 없습니다. 여러분이 책을 읽기 시작했는데 정해진 기간 동안 너무나 양이 많다는 것을 알게 되었다면, 여러분은 스스로를 돌보기 위해 잠시 책 읽기를 미루어도 괜찮다는 것을 알려드립니다.

교회 속 그리스도인

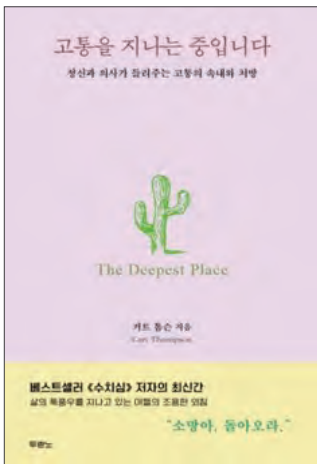

저자 조정민 목사는 공공연하게 기독교에 대하여 비판을 하거나 적대적인 자들의 시선의 문제 보다, 교회 안에 속해 있으면서도 여전히 그리스도를 따르지 않는 사람들에 대한 문제의 심각성이 「교회 속 그리스도인」을 쓰게 된 동기라고 밝힌다. 그리스도인은 ‘날마다’ 자기를 부인하고 자기 십자가를 지고 그리스도를 따르는 자이다. 문제는 이렇게 살지 않으면서도 교회 안에 남아 있는 자들을 발견한 저자는 이들을 반(反)그리스도인이라고 부른다. 그는 교회 안에 있는 반그리스도인들의 특징을 다음과 같이 소개한다. 그러한 사람들은 이기적인 자, 믿음이 없이 낙심한 자, 음란에 빠진 자, 그리스도의 영광보다 자기 영광을 누리지 못해 섭섭해 하는 자, 감사 보다 불만을 쏟아내는 자, 이 세상의 소유에 집착하는 자, 주어진 시간과 환경 속에서 주를 위해 부지런히 살기 보다 게으른 자이다. 각 장의 마지막에 있는 ‘함께 읽고 나누기’는 독자들을 온전한 그리스도인으로 살아가는 지혜로 인도할 것이다.

그리스도인으로서 고통을 하나님의 시선으로 어떻게 이해할 수 있을까? 「고통을 지나는 중입니다」는 정신과 의사인 커트 톰슨이 인간 영혼의 가장 깊은 곳에 자리 잡고 있는 고통의 문제를 회피하기 보다 직면할 때 도달하게 될 정신적이고 영적인 유익에 대하여 소개한다. 저자는 “인간의 성장은 진보가 아니라 인간의 가장 깊은 곳에 자리잡고 있는 감정들이 더 편안해지고, 슬픔과 함께 하며, 역설적으로 그 곳에서 더 깊어지는 기쁨을 발견하는 것”으로 소개한다. 그는 심리학적으로 고통의 깊은 골짜기를 지나는 과정을 통해 하나님과의 애착 관계를 성서적 말씀을 기초로 풀어준다. 인간의 정신적 문제로서 고통이 아니라 하나님과의 애착의 과정으로서 고통은 비록 고통과 탄식의 어려운 여정이지만 궁극적으로 하나님의 산 소망에 이르게 하는 영적 성숙의 여정임을 말한다. 고통은 하나님을 붙잡을 수 있는 믿음으로 이끌며, 삶의 전쟁 속에서도 예수를 만남으로써 화평을 누리게 한다. 이 과정은 홀로 하는 것이 아니라 고통을 함께 품고 풀어나갈 공동체를 통해 주시는 은혜를 통해 하나님의 영광에 도달하도록 우리를 안내한다. 고통을 지나는 이 과정은 우리에게 인내를 통해 예수의 성품을 갖게 하고 아름다움에 가득 찬 하나님의 사람으로 성숙하게 한다. 커트 톰슨의 이 책을 다 읽고 나면 하나님의 마음을 닮은 영적 지혜자와의 동행에 감사를 말하게 된다. 이 책은 고통에 관한 관심을 가지고 있는 이들이 소그룹을 만들고, 로마서 5:1-5절을 모일 때 마다 함께 읽고, 각 장의 주제에 대한 나눔과 실천을 행한다면, 고통을 지나서 우리를 맞이하려고 기다리시는 산 소망의 하나님의 품에 안기는 기쁨을 맛볼 것이다.

마음을 따르지 않을 용기: 이 시대를 집어삼킨 ‘나’라는 신에 맞서다

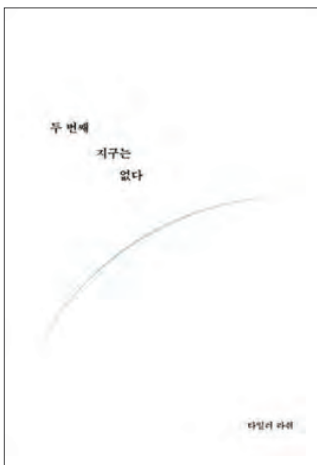
사디어스 윌리엄스 지음, 윤종석 번역

사디어스 윌리엄스는 오늘날 가장 급성장하는 전세계의 인기 종교의 자리에 “자기중심성”이 지위를 획득하고 있다고 말한다. 자아 숭배를 교리로 하는 이 종교는 이 시대를 집어삼킬 십계명을 전파하고 있다. 철저히 자기만을 사랑하고 숭배하는 일에 거침이 없게 만드는 이 종교는 삶의 목적이 자아를 영화롭게 하는 것이다. 날마다 발전을 거듭해가는 첨단 문화를 사용하여 자신의 감정에 충실히 살아가라는 가르침은 자아를 숭배하는 이들의 삶의 방식을 규정한다. 이들은 자아가 인생의 진리 기준이며 한 번 뿐인 인생이기에 타인을 고려하기 보다 주관적 자기표현을 진리의 진정성으로 삼으며 자기의 꿈을 추구하고자 한다. 자기중심성을 숭배하는 이들은 자신의 행복한 삶, 첨단 삶의 방식, 마음의 해방, 독창성, 관용, 모험, 내적 깨달음, 진정성 그리고 꿈의 실현과 같이 화려해 보이지만 이러한 삶은 혐오와 편견에 사로잡힌 사랑에 도달하게 할 뿐임을 저자는 경고한다. 윌리엄스는 이러한 자기중심성의 문제는 거대한 비사유(unthought)라고 본다. 그는 그리스도 안에 있는 진정한 삶의 목적이나 가치를 버리고 자아에 몰두하는 삶은 공허나 절망에 도달할 뿐임을 일깨운다. 그리스도를 사랑하면 할수록 더욱 자유로워지고 일상의 삶에서도 영원의 의미를 누릴 수 있는 구원과 자유의 삶은 각각의 장의 뒷부분에 10가지 자기중심성에 맞서는 기도문과 실천할 수 있는 깊이 있는 질문들을 통해 큰 도움을 받을 수 있다. 이 책은 자신의 마음, 감정, 만족을 추구하는 것에 맞서 예수 그리스도의 진리 안에 깨어 하나님께 영광을 돌리는 진리(Truth)와 자유를 누리는 시간을 선물 받을 것이다.

두 번째 지구는 없다

타일러 라쉬 지음

기후의 위기 문제는 더 이상 예언자들의 경고의 차원이 아니라, 우리의 일상 깊숙이 들어와 있다. 저자 타일러는 제작비가 더 들더라도 친환경적인 인쇄 방법과 인쇄 종으로 출판하려고 노력을 해왔다. 드디어 「두 번째 지구는 없다」가 우리 곁에 찾아왔다. 세계자연기금(WWF)의 홍보대사이기도 한 그가 이 책을 낸 이유는 ‘겨울 냄새’ 그리고 ‘계절의 냄새’를 모르고 잠들어 버린 슬픈 지구인에게 환경 위기를 모른 채, 자연을 경제적으로 허비하는 일에 취해 있는 인류를 일깨우고자 함이다. 타일러는 자연과 환경에 대하여 방송에서는 마음껏 들려줄 수 없던 그의 환경에 대한 이해와 실천을 촉구하기 위한 이야기를 이 책에서 소개한다. 그가 고향 버몬트의 밤길에서 만난 오로라를 통해 받았던 위로와 신비를 더 이상 경험하지 못한다는 것은 상상하고 싶지 않은 미래이다. 환경을 보존하고 지구를 지키는 선택은 비용이 매우 많이 드는 비경제적인 방법임에 틀림없다. 하지만 수많은 별빛이 눈으로 뒤덮인 땅을 비추고 나뭇가지가 은빛으로 빛나는 모습을 보면서 우리가 건강하게 숨을 쉴 수 있는 환경은 누구나 소망한다. 이 소망을 지키기 위해서는 기후 위기의 문제를 경제적인 비용의 잣대로만 볼 것인 아님을 우리의 호흡과 폐, 그리고 피부는 벌써 반응하고 있다. 이 책을 읽고 나면 지구의 환경 보존 특히 기후 위기 속에서 나는 무엇을 해야 할 것인가를 고민하는 자신을 발견하게 될 것이다.



고백의 언어들: 나의 인생 나의 하나님

김기석 지음

‘하나님 안에서, 하나님과 함께, 하나님을 향하여’라는 김기석 목사님의 강연이 「고백의 언어들」로 출판되었다. 20대에 목회를 시작한 저자가 60대에 은퇴하기까지 하나님의 말씀과 씨름하면서 만난 그의 인생과 하나님에 대한 고백이 이 책에 담겨 있다. 신학은 위대하신 하나님에 대한 고백의 언어이기에 객관성이 제외된 모호함(ambiguity)을 특징으로 갖는다. 저자는 신학적 사유 방식의 모호함 앞에서 겸손하고 진지하게 하나님을 믿는 믿음으로 부지런히 씨름하면서 만난 하나님에 대한 그의 고백을 소개해 준다. 그는 성경은 ‘매끈한 언어’가 아니라 믿음의 사람들이 인식의 확장과 심화를 통해 해석해야 하는 ‘주름진 텍스트’라고 말한다. 그는 성경 말씀 속에 있는 무수한 이야기들을 자신의 고백의 언어로 풀어가면서 숨어 계신 것 같은 하나님을 만나고 그 하나님을 자신의 창조적 언어로 삶을 고백하도록 본을 보여준다. 이 책은 구약 성서에 나오는 가장 중요한 주제인 창조, 죄, 인간 그리고 하나님의 구원의 이야기의 주름진 텍스트 속에 숨겨져 있던 하나님의 마음과 섭리를 저자의 목소리를 들려준다. 신앙은 하나님 안에서 하나님과 함께 하나님을 향하여 가는 순례의 과정으로서 성경 말씀 속에 잠겨져 있던 하나님의 위대하심과 그 사랑의 빛장을 풀어가면서 하나님의 신비를 만나는 여정이다. 이 여정에서 김기석 목사의 신앙 고백의 언어는 모호성 뒤에 있는 하나님의 위대함에 손 내밀게 하는 마중물이 된다. 이 책을 읽는 나의 인생과 나의 하나님에 대한 고백을 질문함으로써 우리는 더 큰 신앙의 바다로 항해를 하게 될 것이다.
